- Promote active stewardship of open space parks and other natural areas

- Elicit new ideas for land stewardship from the community
- Provide participants with tools to act as advocates for land stewardship within their communities

- List actions they can take to ensure open lands remain sustainable, safe, and available to all visitors and
- List actions they can take to ensure open lands provide sustainable and safe habitat for native flora and fauna
